

Applying to do a PhD

Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) or 'doctorate' is the highest level of degree that a student can achieve. Applicants for a PhD should hold or expect to obtain a first or upper second class honours degree (or an equivalent qualification) in a subject relevant to the proposed area of study. Some Institutions will also require a master's degree (such as an MA, MSc or MRes).

How to apply for a PhD

Prospective PhD students are usually expected to submit a research proposal to the department they wish to undertake their study in. Applications are usually online and applicants are advised to discuss their application prior to submission with relevant academics working in that field.

How long does it take?

A PhD usually lasts three years (four for a New Route PhD – see below), or rather, any available funding usually lasts for that time. Students may be able to take extra time in order to complete their thesis but this will usually be at their own expense. For part-time, self-funded students, a PhD can take up to seven years.

Information about the New Route

The New Route PhD (also known as Integrated PhD) is a four-year programme that combines taught elements, including professional and transferable skills, with the student's research. Integrated PhDs are supported by the government, the Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE) and the British Council. There are now hundreds of NRPhD students studying a variety of subjects at a consortium of universities across the UK.
