Applying to Teacher Training for entry 2020

This help sheet outlines the procedures for applying to the Professional Certificate in Education/Postgraduate Certificate in Education, (PGCE) teacher training courses in Northern Ireland, England and Wales, the Professional Graduate Diploma in Education, (PGDE) in Scotland and the Higher Diploma in Education (HDip) and Postgraduate courses in the Republic of Ireland

Introduction

It is important to be clear about your reasons for wanting to teach. If you are not sure, then it would be advisable to spend more time researching teaching as a career and gaining additional experiences before applying. Visit schools, talk to teachers, and gain a realistic picture of the rewards and frustrations of teaching as well as the hard work involved. It is not sensible to apply for teacher training simply because you cannot think of anything else to do with your degree. In your application you will be expected to have demonstrated, over time, your commitment to progressing into this profession – get relevant experience!

Fitness to Teach

All candidates must, by law, satisfy 'fitness to teach' requirements. Your medical fitness will be assessed and you will be scrutinized to ensure that you do not have a criminal record that would inhibit your ability to work safely with children. The provision for convictions to be regarded as 'spent' under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974, does not apply to teaching applications.

All trainee teachers in Northern Ireland have to be AccessNI checked before starting school-based training: See AccessNI for further details – <u>www.accessni.gov.uk</u>

In England Scotland & Wales, the Criminal Records Bureau will check all trainee teachers before starting school-based training. <u>http://www.homeoffice.gov.uk/agencies-public-bodies/crb/</u>

In the republic of Ireland, all potential Trainee Teachers have to have a Garda check carried out before commencing training. The Teaching Council is the authorised body for administering Garda Vetting for teachers Ireland. http://www.teachingcouncil.ie/ (see Vetting tab).



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Teacher Training in Northern Ireland:

In Northern Ireland, postgraduate students can undertake a relevant Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) at either Primary or Secondary level. This is known as initial teacher training (ITT). Teacher Training in GB

Introduction:

You need Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) to teach in UK schools. This is gained normally either by completing a PGCE / PGDE that is normally a one-year full-time course or by completing school centered training which recommends you for Qualified Teacher Status. This is known as Initial Teacher Training (ITT - England & Wales), Initial Teacher Education (ITE - Scotland).

Where to Train:

There is a huge array of Initial Teacher Training / Education Providers in England/Scotland /Wales. Your choice will depend on where you want to go, the subjects, the age range offered and the method by which QTS is obtained. All applications for PGCE, Schools Direct programs or School Centered Initial Teacher training programs can be made through the UCAS – Teacher Training application system.

Teacher Training in England

PRIMARY – General Entry Requirements – (*NB. Double check with specific institutions for any variations*).

- GCSE English Language, Maths and a Science subject. Equivalent qualifications may or may not be acceptable, make sure you check with the institution you intend applying to.
- A good degree (2.2 or above) which does not have to be in a national curriculum subject. Your previous education must provide the necessary foundation for work as a primary school teacher so 'A' levels or equivalent and postgraduate qualifications can also be taken into account.
- Demonstrate **extensive experience** of working with children of primary age preferably in school environment. (The sooner you begin to gain experience the more able you are to demonstrate extensive experience)

SECONDARY - Entry Requirements - (NB. check with specific institutions for variations).

- GCSE Grade C English & Maths.
- Degree in a subject relevant to that which you wish to teach. It is generally expected that at least 50% of your degree subject should be directly relevant.
- Demonstrate experience of working with young people preferably in the school environment. Many course providers insist on a minimum number of days' observation focused on your subject in a secondary school other than the one you attended.

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Finance

Fees are payable for all PGCE courses. Tuition fees vary depending on the course and the Higher Education Institution (HEI) or School Centered Initial Teacher Training (SCITT) provider. You should contact the HEI or SCITT provider of the course or programme you are interested in directly. You may take out a fees loan and may be eligible for a means tested maintenance grant.

A non –repayable bursary may be available dependent on undergrad subject & classification.

Teacher Training in Wales

Training to teach in Wales is broadly similar to training to teach in other parts of the UK, but there are key differences you need to be aware of. The university-based Postgraduate or Professional Certificate of Education (PGCE) route is the same. You can also apply for the Graduate Teacher



Programme in Wales (https://www.ucas.com/postgraduate/teacher-training/train-teach-wales/postgraduate-teacher-training-wales).

School curriculum in Wales differs from that in England. It specifies all subjects should be taught from a Welsh perspective or have a Welsh dimension. Welsh language as either a first or second language is mandatory in both primary and secondary schools. Whilst you do not need to be a Welsh speaker to undertake teacher training in Wales it is likely you will be encouraged to learn Welsh on a primary PGCE course to at least basic level and it may be compulsory as Welsh is a core subject to Key Stage 4. On secondary courses, you may be offered the opportunity to learn Welsh.

Three collaborative ITT Centres of teacher education provide for initial Teacher Training (ITT) Wales. Each Centre comprises of two ITT providers. The structure, organisation and course portfolios of the Centres will vary and will reflect the individual institutions involved. The Centres are:

North and Mid Wales Centre - Bangor and Aberystwyth University. South West Wales Centre - Swansea Metropolitan University and University of Wales. South East Wales Centre - University of Wales, Newport and the University of Wales Institute.

Entry Requirements: Check with specific institutions to confirm criteria for primary and secondary.

Primary teachers teach all the subjects in the Welsh National Curriculum; English, Mathematics, Science, Design & Technology, Information & Communication Technology, Geography, History, Physical Education, Art, Music, Religious Education and Welsh. Your previous education (Degree, A Levels, and equivalent qualifications) should match at least one of these National Curriculum subjects. If you have a Non National Curriculum degree, you should highlight on your application form any modules that relate specifically to primary education Welsh National Curriculum subjects.

Secondary teachers are subject specialists. You are expected to have at least 50%-degree relevance to the specialist-teaching subject being applied for. There may be flexibility in some subjects; other degrees may contain very relevant subject knowledge. For example, engineering, economics, business studies, management science, and health sciences.

Teacher Training in Scotland:

Graduates wishing to train in Scotland must apply for entry to the Professional Graduate Diploma in Education (PGDE), which is normally a one-year full-time course. Some courses are offered part-time or by distance learning although entry to these may be restricted. Please see the 'Teaching in Scotland' website for more details: The PGDE is offered at primary level, (which covers a wide range of subjects and ages: pre-school and 5 to 12), or in individual secondary subjects and ages 12 to 18.

PRIMARY - Entry Requirements:

- Scottish Certificate of Education (SCE) English at Higher Grade Pass/GCSE Grade C or above in **both English Language & Literature**.
- SCE Maths at Standard Grade 1 or 2, GCSE Grade B or above.
- Your education should include at least 2 of the following subjects: Science, Social Studies, Expressive Arts, Religious and Moral Education, Technology, Modern Foreign Language.
- A degree that will give you the necessary foundation for working as a primary school teacher and *extensive experience* of working with children of primary school age *preferably* in a school environment.

SECONDARY - Entry Requirements:

• Scottish Certificate of Education (SCE) English at Higher Grade, GCSE Grade C in both English Language and Literature (Maths is not required).



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- Degree content must contain two passes (80 credit points) in subject relevant to that you wish to teach and at least 40 credits must have been gained in the second or later years of the course. Make sure you check with institution that you wish to study at that your degree satisfies their criteria.
- Some subjects have additional requirements and you should check these with the individual institution's website for details.

Interviews

Applicants who are short-listed will be interviewed. Selectors look for:

- Knowledge of the Scottish national curriculum guidelines for your subject(s)
- Knowledge of the teaching profession & your Suitability for a career as a teacher.

There is usually an interview, a group activity and to complete a written and practical test in your subject.

Finance

The government bursaries that are offered in England and Wales do not apply to Scotland. If you live in Scotland contact the Student Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) http://www.saas.gov.uk/ Most Scottish domiciled students will have their fees paid if they have not studied a vocational course previously. You can apply for support if your course qualifies you for a Scottish Studentship or other studentship award from a research council or government department and will be entitled to further funding if you wish to teach a number of subjects. See the 'Teaching in Scotland' website for details. Students ordinarily resident outside Scotland should check with their Local Education Authority or, in Northern Ireland their Education & Library Board, as to what funding may be available. You may take out a student loan.

Teacher Training in the Republic of Ireland

Introduction

For all teaching posts you will need a recognised teaching qualification and registration with the Teaching Council in the Republic of Ireland. Primary teachers are qualified to teach the entire range of subjects in the curriculum from junior infants to Sixth class (age range 4-12). Entry to post primary training requires a degree with significant subject content which enables you to teach at least one curriculum subject to Leaving Certificate at Higher Level geared towards the 11-18 age range.

NB: If you obtain teaching qualification outside Ireland in an EEA member state and wish to return to Republic of Ireland to teach you will need to complete any required period of post-qualification professional practice in that member state before registering with the Teaching Council for Ireland.

Entry Requirements

Degree recognised by the General Teaching Council. It is vital to check that your degree is one of a list of approved degree courses – before applying to a PME. There is no requirement to pass an Oral exam in Irish, but if you wish to teach in a secondary school you will be required to undertake a written test in the history of education in Ireland. 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Teacher Training – Further Education (FE)

The Further Education (FE) sector covers post-compulsory education 16+ years and, for the most part, is based in further education and sixth form colleges or adult and community settings. Lecturers teach at a variety of levels from basic skills and vocational qualifications to Foundation degrees. It is not essential to have a professional teaching qualification in order to obtain a post, although most entrants are graduates. In certain subjects, especially in areas such as construction trades, it may be possible to enter with relevant work experience, however regulations introduced in 2007 specify that all teachers/lecturers who have a full range of teaching responsibilities must attain qualified status within a specified number of years, (ranging from two to five), of taking up their post.

However, it is still possible to enter FE teaching with no teaching qualification and begin a qualification once in post teaching. It is up to individual colleges which qualifications they might ask for. Some colleges put all new teachers through their own in-house 30-week training programme, others insist on qualifications prior to starting.

Teachers who have qualified to teach in post primary schools and have obtained Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) are eligible to teach in the Further Education (FE) sector but will be required to obtain the specialist FE qualification whilst in-service.

Lecturers in FE may be appointed to full or associate positions. Full lecturers undertake the complete range of teaching and planning while associates have less responsibility and often less hours.

Teachers of all subjects will be expected to have at least a level three qualification in their specialist subject. They will also need evidence of level 2 (GCSE or equivalent) English, Maths and ICT to apply for Qualified Teacher Learning and Skills (QTLS).

Teachers of literacy, numeracy or English for Speakers of Other languages, (ESOL) will be expected to have a good knowledge of the subject they intend to teach - shown through A' levels or university study, or through other qualifications or experience. They will also need to have good personal skills in the supporting areas of English, Maths and ICT.

Starting Point

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In Northern Ireland a recognised teaching qualification is not required **initially** to obtain a post in the FE sector but is expected to be obtained within 3 years of taking up employment.

The qualifications recognised for teaching in the NI Further Education Sector are:

- The Certificate in Teaching (CIT) at Ulster University. It is a recognised qualification for those working in the learning and skills sector. It is a pre-requisite that you have a minimum of 4 teaching hours per week.
- Post Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE), obtained in the UK;
- Post Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE / PME), obtained in the Republic of Ireland (provided the individual also holds a 'conditional registration' or 'full registration' with the Teaching Council of Ireland);
- Bachelor of Education Degree (B.Ed), obtained in the UK or the Republic of Ireland;
- University of Ulster BA (Honours) in Education;
- Northern Ireland Post Graduate Certificate in Further and Higher Education (PGCFHE).
- The addition of a further year of study for the Postgraduate Diploma in Further and Higher Education provides eligibility to teach in post primary schools.
- Northern Ireland Post Graduate Certificate in Education (Further Education) (PGCE (F.E). The Certificate in Teaching (mentioned above) is a pre-requisite to entry onto the PGCE(FE).

Prospective lecturers who do not hold one of the qualifications listed above, may still be eligible to apply for a teaching post, provided they complete the in-service PGCE (Further Education) teaching qualification. Prospective lecturers with a B.Ed. or PGCE may be required to undertake further professional development.

Since August 2012, all new full-time, associate and part-time **Essential Skills** lecturers must hold a degree in the chosen subject specialism or a degree that forms a minimum of 50% of the subject studied. In addition, all new Essential Skills lecturers, who do not hold a teaching qualification that is recognised for teaching in the Northern Ireland FE sector (see above) must achieve Year 1 of the Post Graduate Certificate in Education (Further Education (PGCE (FE) within the first year of appointment. The second year must be successfully completed within the next two years.

Funding

If you are not being supported by your employer the funding available will be as for an undergraduate course. There are no bursaries available in Northern Ireland.

Full teaching roles require that you are registered with the Institute for Learning: www.ifl.ac.uk and obtain the Qualified Teacher Learning and Skills (QLTS).

Associate teaching roles require that you obtain Associate Teacher Learning and Skills (ALTS) status within five years of being appointed to the post.

FE teaching qualifications

There are no two ways about it: this bit can be confusing. There is a suite of teaching qualifications approved for the sector and offered by Universities, Colleges and other providers but they have various names. There are also in circulation qualifications from previous approved series. We try to make sense of it in the following:

- Level 3 Award in Education and Training (QCF)
- Level 4 Certificate in Education and Training (QCF)
- Level 5 Diploma in Education and Training (QCF)
- Level 5 Diploma in Education and Training including a specialist pathway (QCF)
- Level 5 integrated specialist diplomas (QCF)
- Level 5 standalone specialist diplomas (QCF)

Training to Teach in FE in Wales

To teach in FE colleges in Wales, you need to hold, or gain, an Institute for Learning, http://www.ifl.ac.uk endorsed teaching qualification, for Wales. Training courses may be taken either full or part-time. The



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one-year full-time route is usually taken pre-service and is offered at the universities of <u>South Wales</u>, (Newport), <u>Glyndwr</u> and <u>Cardiff</u>. Contact FE colleges for details of part-time courses available and to organize some teaching hours if you do not have a teaching post already.

Funding

You may apply for a fees loan and if you normally live in Wales you will also be entitled to a tuition fee grant and loan. Training Incentive grants for Maths and Science may be available to provide support for living costs with additional help from Student Finance depending on your circumstances. Training to Teach in FE in Scotland

In order to teach in the FE sector in Scotland you will normally require a degree/HND, or professional qualification and relevant employment in business or industry however a teacher training qualification is not mandatory. - Teachers of academic subjects may be trained to teach in the post-primary sector and hold a Postgraduate Diploma in Education (PGDE).
- Most FE lecturers take the Teaching Qualification in Further Education (TQFE) which is offered by the Universities of <u>Stirling</u>, <u>Aberdeen</u> and <u>Dundee</u>.

Funding

As training is undertaken in-service employers receive a government grant in respect of fees. Some lecturers self-fund as there may be a waiting list for funded places on a course. Scottish students studying in Scotland and taking a Professional Graduate Diploma in education (PGDE) in a priority subject normally will have their fees and a bursary paid. Students domiciled outside Scotland will need to apply to their local authority / education and library board to ascertain what funding may be available.

Moving from further education into school teaching

Since April 2012, lecturers in further education who hold Qualified Teacher Learning and Skills (QTLS) status, and are members with the Society for Education & Training, you are eligible to work as a qualified teacher in schools in England.
