#### **Volunteering Opportunities**

Volunteering is giving your time to help someone else or a cause you care about, Volunteering can provide the opportunity to help others, gain experience, improve career prospects and meet new people.

Work in the voluntary/community sector (sometimes referred to as "Third Sector" or "Social Economy") is often an essential prerequisite for entering careers such as social work where you are expected to have detailed knowledge of work activities, proof of particular skills and empathy with clients. Similarly, if you hope to pursue a career in the Media, Arts and Design industry, voluntary work with such groups will be a great asset.

Organisations value the help given by students who demonstrate reliability, commitment, enthusiasm, patience and flexibility.

#### **Benefits of volunteering**

- In an increasingly competitive market, it's a good idea to set yourself apart from the pack. Work experience and further study are both useful, but a recent study from Reed Executive found that three quarters of employers prefer to recruit candidates with volunteering experience on their CV.
- It helps you demonstrate self-reliant skills such as taking responsibility for your own career and personal development and people skills such as communication, leadership and team working. It also helps build confidence and can help you discover new hobbies and interests.
- It allows you to practice volunteerism and 'give something back to society', as well as letting you play a part in your community.
- Volunteering can help you build your network and gain useful contacts.
- The Voluntary/community sector is expanding rapidly and organisations in the sector are interested in recruiting more graduates. Having previous experience as a volunteer and gaining knowledge of the organisation and its ethos may give you an advantage at the selection stage.

#### What jobs could I do?

Voluntary and community sector work tends to fall into the following categories:

- Administrator
- Advice worker/advocate for client groups
- Children/youth work/education/sport
- Conservation & environmental projects
- International aid / Development Worker
- Lobbying/campaigning/fundraising/research
- Social/probation work
- Training and development officer/manager
- Working with the sick/people with a disability
