Image Gallery in PURE Profiles

Introduction

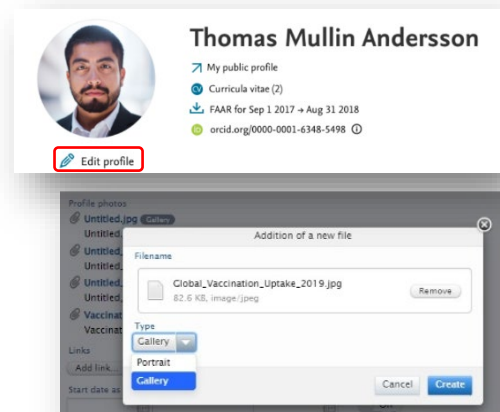
An 'Image Gallery' has been added to PURE Profiles. Images saved on the Researcher profile and marked as 'Gallery' will appear in a carousel underneath the description text.

How to use the Image Gallery

Personal users can add images to the 'Image Gallery' from 'Edit profile' in their Personal Overview screen. Each image must be less than 1 MB in size.

To create 'My gallery':

- Go to 'Edit profile' from your Personal Overview screen
- Click 'Add file' in the 'Profile photos' field
- Upload an image and set image type to 'Gallery'
- Click 'Create'
- Repeat this process for each image.



Viewing the 'Image Gallery'

All the images marked as 'Gallery' will be visible in a carousel under the description text eg Biography, of the Researcher profile in the PURE Portal.

Visitors to the Researcher profile can:

- Click on the arrows on either side of the gallery to scroll through the images
- Click on each of the images displayed in the carousel to view it in full size, with the file name showing (use a file name that best describes the image).



Note: Please check 'Managing your copyright' overleaf and ensure, when you are uploading images, you abide by the Copyright Law.

Managing your copyright

How to use your copyright

Copyright protects your work and stops others from using it without your permission. Copyright protection applies automatically when you create certain types of work such as literary, dramatic, musical, artistic work and more. Copyright applies from the moment this work is fixed in a 'tangible form of expression', eg in a paper copy, digital file, video or audio recording, sheet music, etc.

Who owns copyright

Before you can use a copyright work, you have to be sure that you own it. Ownership may depend on the circumstances under which the work was created. Generally, the originator - ie the person who created the work - is the first owner of the copyright. This rule also applies to commissioned works, unless it is otherwise agreed. However, if a work is created as part of a contract of employment, then the employer is the first owner of these rights, unless agreed otherwise with the creator.

It is possible for two or more people to be joint creators or owners of copyright. Find out more about **contractors and copyright** and read about **ownership of copyright works**.

How can you use copyright

Copyright is a form of intellectual property. You can buy it, sell it, transfer it or inherit it like any other form of property. If you own copyright, you have certain rights to decide if and how others can use your copyright work.
