Collecting opportunity: Increase in new collections of non-Covid material

Types of Material in NI collections	
Medical Related	e.g. scrubs, NHS tributes, locally made hand-sanitizer & masks.
Public info.	e.g. Prime Minister's letter, Government Guidance
Clothing	e.g. T-shirt sold to raise funding for a domestic abuse charity
Photos	e.g. of empty streets, Covid19 -related signage.
Art, crafts, writing	e.g. Quilt inspired by the NHS
Testimony	e.g. Personal diaries and accounts
Anti-Vax	e.g. Ephemera

Reasons for not focusing on building up significant pandemic collections

"none of us had the headspace to go and search out [collections] ... we consciously took a step back from that ... and looked at ways we could link with people and uplift people" (Anon 2)

"it was very much a **knee-jerk reaction**. [Another] Museum is doing Covid collecting and let's jump on the bandwagon... it was all incredibly naïve" (Anon)

"Part of it might be as simple as we all thought this was going to last 3-4 weeks at the outset, possibly 2-3 months" (Anon 4)

Going forward...

- Rationalising collections. ... the 'profusion predicament' in museums.
- Representativeness: less anti-vac material.
- Timing: some museum curators not sure when audiences will be ready for display on Covid.
